Before you paint it is important to keep these tips in mind to ensure you'll be happy with your color choice for years to come!

- **1. Take the Test.** Paint colors will look different depending on light levels the undertones and tint of the color play a major role in this. To ensure you're getting a color you love, pick up some test paint (most paint companies sell sample pints at a highly discounted price) and cover a large area on each side of your house. Then keep an eye on how the colors look throughout the day. It's better to put forth a little extra effort now than to regret your choice once the entire house is painted.
- **2. Smooth the surface.** Probably the most labor intensive part of the painting process is scraping the siding to remove any loose paint. It is difficult, but necessary. For a super smooth surface, go ahead and get out the sander. If your home was built before 1978 it is important to make sure you aren't dealing with lead paint, of which airbone particles can be harmful if inhaled. Pick up a lead test kit at your local hardware store or online, and if you get a positive result, follow extra precautions for removal or consider hiring a professional.
- **3. Clean it up.** To ensure the best coverage, remove dirt and dust buildup with a pressure washer. Be sure to check for mold and mildew while you're at it, and use a mix of water and phosphate-free cleanser if needed.
- **4. Make repairs.** Now is the time to inspect everything that has been uncovered with the washing, scraping and sanding. Minor holes or dings in the siding can be filled with patching putty, but any major damage that is revealed may require the replacement of sections of siding.
